The entry into Jerusalem

They came in their thousands, waiting to meet him, the news of his coming having raced before him. And it wasn't just his followers, it was everyone, men, women and children plucking branches from the trees, tearing off their cloaks, carpeting the road before him, their voices hoarse with shouting. 'Hosanna!' they cried.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!'

There were stranger things to follow, for just a few days later, less than a week in fact, the scene was so very different.

The same people by and large, once more part of a crowd, but this time not love but hatred in their faces, not welcome but rejection, their waving hands suddenly shaking fists, their 'Hosanna to the Son of David' all at once 'We have no king but Caesar!'

I wouldn't have believed it possible if I hadn't seen it for myself, but the sad fact is I not only saw it, in my own way I was part of the whole sorry business, for when the crisis came I was found wanting, concerned only to save my skin with no thought as to his.

It was a chilling lesson, And one that I, like so many others, learned the hard way the lesson that it's easy to call someone king, much harder to actually serve them.

Also after weekday morning Masses by request and any other time by simple arrangement <u>Holy Week</u> - is a week unlike any other. We take ourselves back into the story of salvation on Thursday through to Sunday. It's a grisly story, full of extremes and displaying the best and worst of human behaviour. But it doesn't remain as an episode in history. During Lent we have been reflecting on the Stations of the Cross, reminding ourselves of what we can learn from this old, popular devotion. Not to learn anything would be a huge disappointment. Our journey to meet the Lord at the end of our earthly life is just that - a journey. We don't stand still. In any area of life. We're changing.

Jesus' Holy Week journey has so much to teach us of our God who chose to endure torture and a brutal death to demonstrate he is prepared to sacrifice everything to overcome the cruelty and self-serving skulduggery of some influential people and those too fickle to do other than collude with them.

You and I can usually spot some of our weaknesses, but Jesus' journey can help us to see ways we may not see so clearly how we can keep on growing and following the loving forgiveness of a God who suffers with us.

Please do come and attend our church events on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil which is the most expressive and potent liturgy of the whole year. Thank you.

Good Friday morning this year in the Market Place the churches of the town are putting on a drama about the crucifixion. It's at 10am and we'd love you to come and literally be part of the attending crowd at the crucifixion scene. The Bishop of Durham will end the drama with a comment and a prayer.

Next year a full-scale Passion Play like that done in Trafalgar Square will take place here. If you would like to see this year's Trafalgar Square play, it is being shown live on screen in Bishop Auckland Methodist Church, opposite the hospital, at 12 noon on Good Friday. You'll be most welcome. Our church solemn Good Friday liturgy is at St Mary's at 3 pm.

Food Bank - Once again sincere thanks for your continued support. You have kindly topped up our potato supplies - but on average we use 90 tins a week so you will see this is an ongoing request. As on Thursday we had no coffee and sugar left with tea also getting low. We are in need of dried rice, jam, tinned/packet potatoes, coffee, tuna and sweets for children. We still have a good supply of baked beans, soup and dried pasta so these items are not needed at this time. Your help is so vital and directly assists our neighbours - you are truly living the gospel in this simple act. We give thanks to all our local churches working to keep this project alive. Thank you.
